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Our Mission:

In the hopes and dreams of parents we find our work offering a hand in partnership to families
who have children with emotional or
behavioral challenges -

That self-doubt give way to uncovered strengths, despair be replaced with hope, and the once-diminishing dreams for their children's success will blossom anew.

Community Service:

In July 2013, staff and 38 youth from Families First and Southwoods (a private children's camp in Paradox NY, www.southwoods.com) got together to perform two days of community service. It is very important to both agencies that their youth understand how important it is to give back to their communities. The kids had not met each other prior to the events so there was a period of getting to know each other before getting started each day, but in the end the kids, all from very different backgrounds, worked nicely together.

Planning for the projects took place with the Families First and Southwoods staff's as well as the Elizabethtown Supervisor, the Highway Department, the Director of the Historical Museum in Elizabethtown, and the Director of CATS (Champlain Area Trails).

They did a trail clean up in E-town on Blueberry Hill, a road clean up in New Russia that is assigned to Families First, they weeded and trimmed and cleaned up the botanical gardens at the Museum in E-town and helped carry in bridge building materials and clear trails in Willsboro with CATS.

Overall it was a very successful endeavor and both agencies are looking to work together again next year.













A Word from the Board:

We are currently in a state of acute hope with the widening recognition that support for families of children with emotional and behavioral challenges is clearly needed. The current turmoil of Medicaid Redesign for mental health efforts seems to be resolving and leaning toward our long held belief in providing all necessary help to the family. As 2014 unfolds the Families First staff and Board of Directors will be trying to shape the new model so that revenue from payment for programs encompasses a larger vision of providing all the related services needed. But no matter how successful we are there will be the need for community and volunteer support to complete the task. We are deeply appreciative of the continuing support from all of you and, based upon our past history, we are optimistic here as well. Let's look at some of the details of what has and will be happening.

Security for clients and staff became a priority issue in 2013 and we used eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000) of funds raised by the Board for new safety features for our building on Water Street.

The NYS Office of Mental Health provided a grant for \$37,000 for information technology and electronic medical record hardware and software upgrades and staff training to best use it.


Following a major restructuring at the end of the prior year Families First staff took on the difficult task of doing more with less in 2013 to meet the changing demands of providing mental health help to the families we serve. They succeeded, we are on firmer financial footing heading into a not yet designed government mental health model. Early signs are that the future will be more of a collaborative effort with a wider scope of services coordinated between public and private agencies. We visited with our Congressman, Bill Owens, in the second half of the year to discuss the prospects; his clear advice was to collaborate, and to communicate closely within the entire system including those who authorize and those who pay for the services we provide. We are doing so, and continue to work with a number of other North Country agencies through the North Country Behavioral Healthcare Network (NCBHN). Director, JoAnne Caswell chairs the Board of the NCBHN. This will provide the opportunity for close cooperation between not-for-profit health care agencies in the North Country.

There are a number of changes to the Board of Directors. We are sorry to see Kim Feely and Bob Sorey leave. We continue to attract new talented and dedicated Board members. Winky Thomas, long time supporter and donor, joined the Board in late 2013.



The New York Non-Profit Revitalization Act, aimed at improving the functioning of our sector, becomes effective in July of this year and we will be reviewing our operations and procedures to fully comply with the new requirements.

As Co-chairs we want to conclude that the Board is aware of numerous variables in the entirely new and evolving federal/state model of delivering mental health services to the North Country and New York State. It presents immediate challenges to Families First. But we are also aware that the continuing education and full information managing staff provides us allows our proactive approach, which will only increase as we go forward. Lastly, as we move into this very challenging year we want to acknowledge how satisfying it is to serve with this energetic, experienced, engaged, collaborative group that is completely committed to the mission of Families First.















The pie charts presented identify both income and expense sources and the percentages of the overall amounts associated with each program offered by Families First.



Fiscal Report:

2013 was the year for Families First to perform a Worksite Safety Analysis, as defined by the United States Department of Labor, Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). The tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut in late 2012 prompted our Board of Directors to request a professional safety survey of our agency to find existing or potential vulnerability to workplace violence in our current facility and practices. The results indicated we should add a more advanced security system and schedule annual safety training for both field and administrative staff. Our new alarms and security/safety plan allows for scheduled door locking, or in case of an emergency, immediate building lockdown with a call to our alarm company who will notify the local police and sheriff's department. We also had a training day with Sergeant Chad K. Niles, NY State Police, to discuss staff safety procedures while in the Water Street facility.

Another area where Families First made improvements was information technology (IT). We received a \$37,000 IT grant from OMH in late 2012, and had until the end of 2013 to use the funds or return the unspent monies. This gave us the perfect opportunity to replace our aging network server and computer workstations, as well as upgrade all desktop and laptop computers to the most current Windows Operating System. Between the IT grant and applications to Microsoft, Adobe and New Egg for software donations through the IT clearinghouse, TechSoup, we were able to replace and improve our existing network, with enough left over to have a two-day on-site training session with Ana Currais, CEHRS, from ClaimTrak, our electronic health records software and database provider.

Our proposed 2014 Budget is \$1,080,127, a less than 1% increase from 2013.

Families First Finance and Audit Committee members, Joseph Bogardus (Committee Chair and Board Treasurer), Kip Thompson, Richard Kelly, Nicky Bryant, JoAnne Caswell and Andrea Kuhn continue to monitor agency regulatory compliance, revenues and spending, and make recommendations to strengthen our fiscal position.

A Word from the Executive Director:

2013 has been a year of adjustments. At the end of 2012 we were faced with budget shortfalls that caused us to eliminate two staff positions, thus creating a situation where fifteen staff members now do the same amount of work that seventeen had done. We re-designed our internal staff responsibilities and service delivery mechanisms and have come through the transition quite nicely (continuing to tweak the system for better outcomes). It sounds easy now, but it required a great deal of planning and adjustment on the part of all of the staff. A tremendous team effort. I would like to commend them for all of their hard work!

Looking forward, as a behavioral healthcare provider in New York State we are committed to providing the best possible services to the families of Essex County. We believe that the changing System of Care is headed in the right direction and that by continuing to collaborate with other behavioral healthcare providers, as well as medical providers, schools, social service agencies and parents, we will come out the other side with a system that provides improved health, better health care quality and consumer experience, and lower costs (the Triple Aim).

During the past year Families First has become part of a new county wide coalition called the Essex County Suicide Prevention Coalition. The goals are to increase community awareness, promote education and increase action to reduce suicides. In addition, we are partnering regionally with Franklin and Clinton Counties to help achieve these goals.

Families First continues to participate in the Adirondack Non Profit Network (ANN), working to create stronger connections between the regions nonprofits, allowing them to better support the people they serve. In November, ANN sponsored an Economic Impact Summit, held at the Wild Center in Tupper Lake. The survey showed that the non profit sector accounts for about 10% of the total workforce in the Adirondack Region, thus playing a critical role, which should not be underestimated. This year we have been very fortunate to have two Masters level interns from SUNY Albany. Alyssa Pullmain and Twila Quaid organized and ran a Children's Social Skills Group, focused on cooking, and provided skill building and family support services to HCBS Waiver families. They will soon be leaving us and will certainly be missed. We wish them all the best in their future careers.



A Parent Testimonial:

Our journey with Families First began in May of 2011 when the Mental Health Association in Westport recommended that I contact Families First for help with my daughter.

My daughter at that time was physically violent toward me. She would threaten to run away. There were days when she would threaten to kill me and herself. I never knew what to expect from her on a day to day basis. She had a lot of problems with social and coping skills, struggling to interact appropriately with other kids.

At that time I was also experiencing a severe depression episode where I was suicidal and sleeping or crying most of the time. I felt like a failure as a parent, nothing I was doing seemed to help at all.

Then Families First came into our lives and things started to change. Within a few months Dottie was enrolled in the HCBS Waiver Program. We had a team of people that worked together to help us. We had a Neuro Psych evaluation done which really helped us to understand Dottie's diagnosis and thus what was going on with her. We were then able to address things like triggers and fears and develop strategies to help me deal with my daughter like time outs, creating routines, walking away,

and making sure that I took care of myself as well. We came up with a chart system where Dottie could earn rewards for good behaviors. I can't really believe or explain how much our family has changed over the past few years. It's almost like we are a completely different family. Dottie was discharged from the Waiver program in February of 2014, as she can now make safer choices and has met all of her goals on her service plan.

I thank God for Families First, because of all of the ways they have helped us become a better family. Thank you Families First for being there when we needed you the most.

No Family Should Have To Struggle Alone

Development Report:

In 2013 the Development Department was part of an agency restructuring, resulting in my position as Development Director changing from full-time to half-time. The other half of my time is spent overseeing our Family Resource Center program and conducting intakes for all new agency participants. I was delighted to be part of our program services again. I meet with every parent seeking our services and am privileged to hear their story. This has brought me much closer to "the lifeblood" of our agency and renewed my passion for our work. Far from the two aspects of my job being disparate, I feel that they are integrally connected, in that I see daily why we are so desperately needed. Despite the strides made in understanding mental illness, our society still has a long way to go to erase the stigma associated with it. It's also a sad reality that services for families who have children with mental health issues are still underfunded compared to the need. It makes your generosity as donors even more critically important. Donor gifts strengthen us as an agency, helping us to weather economic downturns, add to administrative and program funds, and to provide those extra, special services and support such as our Holiday Drives and weeklong camp experience.

Our donor base remains strong and we continue to welcome new donors each year. We had forty seven new donors in 2013 (see names in Bold). Established donors are those who give year after year. Many of our donors have given for five years or more and those names have an asterisk next to them. We now have database records going back ten years and want to recognize those donors who have given for ten years, as noted by the double asterisk next to their name. In addition, we continue to develop relationships with local foundations. We thank all of you, old and new, for the wonderful support you have given for our work. The lives of Essex County families who have children with mental health issues have been enriched through your support.





Collaboration: It is amazing how a group of concerned providers intent on positive collaboration can make such a change in a child's life. Recently "Scott" was at risk of being residentially placed because he could not function successfully at school or at home. He had been psychiatrically hospitalized numerous times and had many instances of police involvement. At school he was having excessive behavior problems leading to numerous time outs, physical restraints, and being dismissed early. He also often refused to go to school at all. His Case Manager at Families First and his school counselor put their heads together to try to figure something out. With significant collaboration, a neuro psych evaluation to help clarify things, and changes to his school plan, they have been successful in turning things around. Currently "Scott" is attending school on a full day basis with no significant behavior problems and has not been hospitalized since this enhanced collaboration. His team and his family are much more hopeful for his future.

Advocacy: Recently Families First Staff and some members of our Youth Empowerment group attended a Legislative Awareness Day in Albany and met with Assemblyman Stec and Senator Little. The kids worked very hard to write down the message that they wanted to share with the politicians to make sure that funding continued for Community Based Mental Health Services. One young man concluded his conversation by saying "I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for my team at Families First. I am now a volunteer fire fighter, advocate for myself, attend youth groups and speak of my story. I am thankful for my team." We are so proud of these young people, learning to advocate for themselves and their peers.

Success: Before we picked up "Susie" on the HCBS Waiver program she had been psychiatrically hospitalized six times in a one year period and her family was considering placement in a residential treatment facility. Currently it has been over a year and "Susie" has not been hospitalized once. One of the most critical factors in this success was the utilization of Intensive In Home services. These services are ongoing activities aimed at providing intensive interventions in the home, including psycho education, crisis de-escalation, parent-child relationship building, and improvement of parenting skills. These interventions establish limited goals based on the presenting crisis and will include linkage to follow-up services whenever necessary. In "Susie's" case the change in relationship between mom and daughter was tremendous, allowing mom to take a much more active role in parenting and supporting her daughter and assisting with other measures such as safety plans, collaboration with the school and coordination of services. "Susie" is much more positive about her life and future!

The Family Support Program provides services and activities that are designed to enhance the abilities of children to function as part of family units and to increase the families' abilities to care for the children in their homes and in community-based settings. Family Support Services target parents/caregivers and their needs. These activities include, but are not limited to:

- Advocacy which may include opportunities to attend various trainings and/or conferences that support parent/caregiver participation and allow families to become part of a "larger voice" for children's mental health awareness.
- Family/Peer Support Information/referral and support
- Skill Building/Educational Opportunities Training and educational workshops for parents/caregivers and
- 1:1 Support individualized family planning for dealing with specific home or school related challenges, basic needs, building natural supports, transportation issues, child care issues, life skills, respite needs, information and/or referral and advocacy

The Family Resource Center (FRC) Program is open to all families in Essex County. Services are provided in collaboration with community members and are based on the needs of the families. FRC programs emphasize building strengths and abilities in order to maximize the capacity of families to raise healthy children and contribute to their communities. Families First provides a wide array of services through its FRC Program including but not limited to the following:

- Educational Workshops
- Support Groups
- Information and Referral
- Family Social Programs
- Strengths and Needs Assessments
 Resource Library

• Structured Playgroups

• Assistance with Basic Needs

Family Resource Centers benefit families in that:

- Parents and caregivers become more aware of child development and their skills are enhanced.
- Parents interact and communicate positively with their children.
- Families are connected with other families and are involved in their communities.

Program Report:

Established in 1992, Families First is a private, not for profit, parent designed, community based agency that provides support to any family in Essex County who has a child; with a particular emphasis on those who have children with emotional and/or behavioral challenges who are at risk of out-of-home placement. A variety of support services are provided to help families maintain their children at home. The services offered are individualized to match each family's strengths and needs. Services may include some combination of the following: HCBS Waiver, Intensive Case Management, crisis intervention, family support, support groups, Family Resource Center, transportation, home based visits, advocacy, youth activities, social & recreational activities, and a food shelf. Through flexible and individualized service plans, parents are provided the support needed to create a safe, nurturing, positive environment for their child to learn and grow. We strive to make every creative effort so that children can stay in their own homes and communities and we believe that all families have strengths that should be recognized and appreciated.

The Home & Community Based Waiver Services (HCBS) Program provides services to children who have complex mental health needs in their homes and communities, decreases the need for placements, promotes better outcomes and delivers cost effective services. The HCBS Waiver Program is currently available to twelve families in Essex County with children between the ages of 5–17, who have mental health diagnoses and are at risk of out-of-home placement. There is currently a waiting list for services in this program. Youth on the waiting list for the HCBS Waiver Program may receive interim services through the ICM, Family Support and Family Resource Center Programs.

Intensive wraparound supports may include:

•Family support •Crisis response •Skill building •Intensive-In-Home Services •Respite •Youth Groups

The Intensive Case Management (ICM) Program provides services to families that have children with mental health diagnoses who are at potential risk of residential placement. Case Management services help avoid unnecessary institutionalization and hospitalization. The ICM program is currently available to 24 families in Essex County. Youth on the ICM waiting list are offered services through the Family Support and Family Resource Center programs to help them bridge the gap while they are waiting for ICM services.

Services include: • Intake and screening • Case coordination • Limited respite • Family support • Youth groups • Assessment • Monitoring and follow up • Crisis response • Transportation

Team Work, Collaboration, Advocacy and some Amazing Successes - comprise many of the highlights for services provided this year!

<u>Team Work:</u> The field staff at Families First work in a regional team structure comprised of one HCBS Waiver Case Manager, one ICM Case Manager and two Family Support Specialists. They are tasked with making sure that all families in their region receive services that are appropriate to their needs, coordinated and individualized based on the families strengths. Recent solicitations about how the teams are working yielded the following comments. Our regional teams get along very well. We push each other to do our best, consult with one another, and praise each other for a job well done. We cry on each other's shoulders and laugh at each other's annoying habits. The team dynamics work well and any child who gets assigned one of us, has the support of the entire team. I have observed my co-workers spend hours on the phone contacting agencies, schools, doctors and families following through with what they said they would do and other co-workers going above and beyond the call of duty putting in long days to serve our families. Our team has good communication with each other, asks questions and feels each other's input is valuable. Being able to provide services as part of a regional team fills me with confidence and pride. The staff really pulled together this past year to make sure their teams were even stronger than in the past and we are extremely proud of their efforts!

Annual Giving Report:

Our Annual Giving Program runs from January 1 through December 31 each year. We recognize gifts made to the Annual or Endowment Funds and those gifts that were commemorative. A separate list recognizes donors, groups and businesses that supported our Holiday Drives.


